A Little History

AWWA was founded on March 29, 1881, in St. Louis, Missouri, by 22 water utility professionals with a passion for public health. *Journal AWWA* was introduced in 1914. AWWA’s headquarters moved to Denver, Colo., in 1974, and the association continued to grow in terms of members, budget, active volunteers, publications, standards, and events. We have 60,000 members in 43 sections—and in 90 countries outside of North America. Today, our utility members serve 80% of the North American population.

Advocacy

AWWA is the leading voice for the water profession. This work is made possible by the utilities that support AWWA. By providing scientific and technical information to legislators and regulatory officials on all aspects of water policy, AWWA's Water Utility Council, Public Affairs Council, and Government Affairs Office represent the interests of all public water suppliers and their customers. The association also provides late-breaking updates on regulatory and legislative issues to water utilities.

Government Affairs

AWWA's Government Affairs program gives members power through a strong, collective voice. Our Washington, D.C., office is the best resource for keeping up-to-date on changes, getting help with compliance issues, and keeping in touch with key contacts at local, state, and federal levels.

The office is located near the White House, Capitol Hill, and the US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). Our successes include legislative and regulatory efforts focused on these three entities. In fact, AWWA's active participation in USEPA's rulemaking process has directly benefited utilities in many ways. The Washington staff works closely with AWWA's volunteer Water Utility Council (WUC), developing programs to initiate, evaluate, respond to and comment on the issues that directly affect utilities.

Public Affairs

AWWA's Office of Public Affairs, located in Denver, Colorado, offers many programs to help members communicate with key stakeholders and the public.
